UN-COMMON DENOMINATORS

I don't enjoy hearing about the exploits of other people's children and grandchildren – especially grandchildren. When I was young, even before I had a child, I managed to seem interested in tales of children – probably because I still looked forward to having one someday.

When I did have a child, I was definitely interested in the exploits of other people with infants and then young, toddling, and school aged children. I could share my own exploits with them. As my child grew, I often shared anecdotes and experiences with other young parents and feigned interest while I waited my turn to participate. As we go through life, we all gravitate to people like us, culturally, economically, socially. Humans have a natural desire to share their experience. We derive comfort in learning about people like us who share our values, our lifestyles and from whom we can sometimes learn better ways of doing the things we universally do.

Then Peter died. Suddenly I had nothing in common with the people I had spent a lifetime traveling through life with. I was experiencing a new kind of pain. There were no words to describe what I was feeling. Those who knew me tried to comfort me by sharing pain they had experienced, losses they had endured. They were attempting to arrive at a common experience so they could commiserate. But there was no common experience. Their losses – their parents, pets, other relatives – though I had also experienced similar losses – this time there was nothing we had in common. Instead of consoling me, their inability to relate to my devastating experience simply served to enrage me

We are a group seeking support in our grief or are able to give it. Among us your religion, your race, your politics, your job or social standing are not important. We care about your grief—the tragedy that each of us have shared—and how we can grow through it, not back to the person we were, but to the person we can become.

GRIEF: When Does It Stop Hurting

Grief reminds one of the few things that has the power to silence us. It is a whisper in the world and a clamor within. More than sex, more than faith, even more than its usher death, grief is unspoken, publicly ignored except for those moments at the funeral, that are over too quickly, or the conversations among those of us who recognize in one another a kindred chasm deep in the center of who we are.

Maybe we do not speak of it because death will mark all of us sooner or later. Maybe it is unspoken because grief is only the first part of it. After a while it becomes something less sharp, but larger, to a more enduring thing called loss. Perhaps that is why this is the least explored passage: because it has no end.

The world loves closure, loves a thing that can, as they say, be gotten through. This is why it comes as a great surprise to find that loss is forever, that two decades after the event there are those occasions when something in you cries out at the continual presence of an absence. The landscape of all our lives becomes as full of craters as the surface of the moon. We are all defined by who we have lost.

It was only when I discovered other parents whose children had died, that I recognized the common denominator that would ultimately save me. Because there were no words to describe what I was going through, I realized that only other people who had experienced *this* loss understood what I was feeling. They didn't have words either, but I knew they knew. It was the most healing thing I did. Reaching out to other parents like myself.

I have a friend who has never had children. When I told her I wasn't interested in grandchildren stories told by several of our coworkers, she admitted that it bothered her all her life but she didn't feel she was justified in not caring. It was only when I shared my impatience with these story tellers that she felt she could admit that these "conversations" bothered her too. Why do people with children and grandchildren feel it is okay to discuss the exploits of these kids with people who have no surviving children? Isn't there anything else they can talk about? How about books, travels, theater, politics, current events, the weather...

Being the parent of a child no longer living in this world is a real challenge. Even having a surviving child comes with the life-long terror of knowing what is possible. I think one of the things that bothers bereaved parents is the nonchalance of parents and grand-parents (especially grandparents) who can't wait to talk about these grandchildren to anyone who will listen. I delight in changing the subject anytime anyone tries to tell me about these offspring. Especially other bereaved parents. They should know better.

Oh well, winter's almost done. Spring can't be too far away. Soon I'll be able to talk about my garden. I wonder if that bothers people who don't have one?

BORN STILL: A MISUNDERSTOOD GRIEF

I find myself writing this maybe because I hurt, maybe because I just have to.

I am just two years bereaved, and have belonged to TCF for about a year and a half now. My son died when I was full term with him. In my search for help to assist me through my own grief (I have tried to help others understand what it is that we who have lost a baby – a child at birth – feel.) Sometimes it is very difficult to explain my feelings, because Sean never lived outside my womb. But because he was vibrantly alive inside of me for nine months I grew to know him as he developed.

Sometimes I think back and try to remember the happy memories of time with my son. He loved fettucine alfredo, but it had to have broccoli or shrimp in it. I think about the kind of music he liked, and of the songs he liked me to sing to him.

Sean liked me to rub him to sleep. I remember that he hiccupped so often it sometimes drove me nuts! Oh, how I miss those days. But because of those days – even through this intense pain – I also have joy. I have joy because I had my son at all; because I loved my son, because I mothered him.

When I was first bereaved, I looked at people who had "time" with their children and thought to myself, "well, at least you had them for (however long it was). I know other grieving

parents look at me and think, "well, at least you didn't get to know him." I know now how wrong I was, and also how wrong they are. No matter what amount of time we have with our child, we all feel the same pain of loss.

We should never have to bury our children.

I have pain because Sean died, because I had only ten minutes with him outside my womb, because I never saw his eyes open, never saw him smile, never heard him make a sound. The silence in the delivery room was deafening. I have pain because he lay in a morgue for days, waiting to be buried. I have the pain of seeing my son in his coffin, seeing that coffin closed, having a funeral, putting him in the ground, saying goodbye. Pain because I now must visit him at a cemetery. I grieve his loss terribly, and feel a crater burned into my heart. I feel the emptiness that will never be filled, I feel the loss of my future, my life.

You see, I feel what you feel. Our experiences may be different, you may have had your child longer than I did, but our pain is all the same. Losing a child is a life-altering experience. Things will never be the same, and I don't want it to be!

Sadly, each meeting brings new parents. *THINK BACK...* what would it have been like for you if there had not been any "oldtimers" to welcome you and share your grief and encourage you and tell you that in time, the pain will soften...with time, there is hope.
