Things that happen for a reason....

We've all heard it before. All our lives, the phrase has been in the ether. "Everything happens for a reason." It is a phrase that really rankles me. Those of us traveling this road often complain to each other about the dumb things people say. It used to make me angry. But time has softened my attitude and I've become strangely forgiving. I've concluded that most of these cliches are offered in the spirit of helping...of wanting to offer solace...even though it's pretty dumb to think a cliché can offer anything to anyone who has suffered a loss as catastrophic as ours. One thing I'm sure of ... not everything happens for a reason.

Belief systems are another syndrome that used to bother me. Those who lean heavily on their belief in God and the afterlife used to annoy me. Time has also altered that view. It seems wonderful to me now that some people are so invested in their belief systems that it carries them along on the journey. I sometimes wish I could toss off all my pain and rejoice in the sense that my son has "gone home". Home? Isn't that here with me and his father? Isn't that here with his friends and family, living out the life he spent all of his earthly years growing through and learning about... always working toward living into adulthood and old age... finally experiencing everything he ultimately missed? Having gotten through his childhood and adolescence, didn't he deserve an adult life and some reward for his efforts? August 2023

The Storm of Grief

I have heard grief described as a 'process', heard the words 'stage of grief'.

Process and stages are such tidy words and grief is anything but tidy or orderly.

It is a mess, much like the storm raging outside my window. A storm that buffets me at its will.

Winds that rage, then subside, only to rage again. Rain that drenches me or

drizzles and drizzles until I am wet through.

Sometimes I can hold up an umbrella and take shelter. Other times there is no shelter.

The umbrella is torn inside out and ripped out of my hands, I am let alone and vulnerable to the power of the storm raging around and within.

Sometimes there are m0ments of sunshine and wonder; why is the sun shining?

How can the sun shine at a time like this? It seems almost like an affront as the storm rages on inside.

Then there are the quiet moments of resting in the shade until the next storm rises.

Some of those who watch me being ravaged by the storm say, "get on with your life. Get out of the rain. Why can't you smile? Why can't you be like you used to be?"

But the storm is not of my doing. I cannot control the weather.

Some accuse me of lingering in the storm,

The Compassionate Friends is a mutual assistance self-help organization offering friendship and understanding to bereaved parents, grandparents and siblings. We are a group seeking support in our grief or are able to give it. Among us your religion, your race, your politics, your job or social standing are not important. We care about your grief—the tragedy that each of us have shared—and how we can grow through it, not back to the person we were, but to the person we can become.

Things that happen...

I do harbor a belief that in some matter or form, life is a continuum. I never really believed that before, but when Peter died it was impossible to believe that so large a personality could have simply evaporated. There has to be more. I've been searching for the 'more' for 30 years now.

No, in spite of the company I keep, for me this has been and continues to be a mostly solitary journey. Surrounded by the compassionate friends who share many of my views, I continue to wonder about many of these things. For instance, I know that most people who have known me throughout these 30 years think I'm "over it". Surely those I've met during these years have no idea that Peter is even now, such a major part of my life. Had he lived I suspect I wouldn't think of him as much. But his absence has become even bigger than his presence. That could be because he was our only child. But maybe not. It just seems that I must deal every day with the ongoing lives of all my contemporaries... and the fact is I have nothing similar to share with them.

So I am often left wondering when I hear that "everything happens for a reason". I think of all I've learned since Peter died. All the children I've 'met' posthumously. All the different ways they were taken from us. Was there a reason for all the mayhem, the pain, the suffering, the loss...? If there is a god, and he really needed our children, couldn't he have made the leaving less violent in some cases, less painful in others. Was there a reason for all the pain and torment?

Julian Barnes, the author, said recently that he doesn't believe in God...but he misses him. I love that. I miss him too. I miss having something to hang on to that would make this life more comprehensible. I miss finding the why in all this. I'm comforted to know that some of my friends, with their very committed, strong belief systems are themselves comforted by those beliefs. I hang on to them and hope that they know something I don't know.

Meanwhile, I move ahead. I continue to share my experience as each year I learn more about it. I stay in the entry to this path to greet those who stagger in so that I can catch them and try to assure them that they will survive. I live as full a life as I can manage and offer myself as an example of how it is possible to recover, reinvent and renew yourself after such a calamity. Time, in its inexorable moving forward, has worked for me. I know that it can work for others and offer that hope. That's my belief system.

of not trying to get away from it.

But the storm follows me wherever I go.

Then there are the precious ones who sit with me in the storm and allow some of it to rage around them too. Somehow, though they cannot change the storm, it doesn't feel quite so cold, there is a little shelter from the wind.

Often we know the storm is brewing, there is some warning as with special days,

anniversaries, birthdays (though what can prepare us for those terrible "firsts"?)

I can plan a little and so deflect the full power of those particular storms.

But what to do about the freak winds that rise up out of nowhere and take my breath away? Hearing a piece of music, smells, sights, movies, meeting one of my childs' friends, married now with children – "where is your life, my love? Where are your children"? The triggers are everywhere, waiting to hurl me into the center of yet another storm. I wonder where is the safe haven now?

Some days there is nothing – no rain, no wind, no sun – nothing. Just an emptiness so deep, I fear I will drown in it. The days, weeks, months, years pas and I notice the sun, and care again that it shines. As I face the elements of my grief, I can now allow the warmth of the sun to rest on my skin and melt my soul a little.

Somehow, despite myself, I learn to live with the storm, maybe even befriend it a little – learn to accept it as part of my life. If my child had not died I would not be in this storm. If I didn't love my child, I would not be in this storm. I cannot change my child's death, I will not change my love.

GRIEF'S ROLLER COASTER RIDE By Dawn Morville Johnson

Do you ever feel you are on a roller coaster ride in your grief over the death of your brother or sister? There are lots of ups and downs. Sometimes the pain is so overwhelming that your heart aches and grief rushes over you. At other times the grief subsides, and you go on living your life.

For siblings the roller coaster ride can last for many years after the death of a brother or sister. That's because at every significant milestone or event in our lives, the grief rises to the surface and we once again confront the death. For our parents, difficult times may be important events that would have occurred in our brother's or sister's life; at a certain age they would have gone to kindergarten, graduated from high school, got a job, got married, had children, and so forth. While mourning the death of their son or daughter, our parents grieve the absence of significant milestones in the life of their child, as well as the absence of the event from the parents' life.

While we as bereaved siblings may also grieve these events that our brother or sister will no longer experience, what is different for us is that these events are actually occurring in our lives. We must live each event without our brother or sister. And this occurs over and over throughout our lives, as we progress through childhood and adulthood, through the happy times and the sad times.

I have seen this occur in my life over the years since my brother Jerry died. As time has passed, my grief has changed. I don't cry as often. I don't visit his grave as often. In that sense, my grief does not weigh as heavily on my heart as it did at first. However, as I have become older and passed through various stages of my life, my grief has resurfaced many times. My brother was 21 when he died. I was 22. Although he was at my college graduation and he saw me get my first "real" job, he wasn't there to give me his opinion when I was trying to decide whether to quit my job and go back to school. He wasn't there when I graduated from law school and passed the bar exam. When I got married a year ago, he wasn't there standing at the front of the church with me. If my husband and I decide to have children, he won't be there as an uncle to celebrate the child's birth. When my parents grow old and decisions have to be made about their health, he won't be there to help me.

As these events have occurred in my life, it is as though I am on a roller coaster ride, approaching a hill. I feel my grief coming on again, with the same intensity of those first weeks and months after he died. I am scared and uncertain as the roller coaster struggles to the top of the hill. The roller coaster reaches the top and then rushes down the hill to the bottom on its way to another hill. When you eventually come down on the other side of each of these hills, it is with a great sense of relief that you made it.

The way I made it through my wedding and other events in my life and have been able to face other "hills" in the roller coaster of my grief is to include him in these events, just as if he were here. For instance, when I have to make a tough decision, I ask myself what advice Jerry would have given me. When I graduated from law school, I took a framed picture of him with me to the graduation. One of my favorite pictures from that day is a photo of me in my graduation gown, standing in front of the stage, holding his picture. When I look at that picture today I realize what an inspiration he was in my decision to pursue a new career. When I got married, I carried my bouquet in his memory and printed a message about that in the ceremony program, along with a thought about him. In addition to the many family pictures taken that day are the ones of me holding Jerry's picture.


