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### **Defining Moments**

We have lots of defining moments in our lives. I think the term refers to how we perceive the world around us, more than who we are. Being born is our first defining moment. As a wee tiny critter, our world is all about need. We don't even know yet about "want". We are defined as infants. As we grow, we are defined as "tots", "kids", then "teens". As teens we are greatly defined – our parents and other adults roll their eyes at our predictable behavior as we test the limits – theirs and the world's. We are exasperating, demanding and experimenting. Adolescent behavior has been well documented. Getting through that part of our lives is fraught with emotional pain and physical danger. It is a rite of passage, and we are defined by this stage of our lives... teen-agers. Everyone knows what that means. What most people don't realize is just how dangerous that time really is.

Once we are young adults we often marry and begin again the natural dance of life. Now we are defined as husbands and wives. We begin to learn about caring for someone else in addition to ourselves. Being part of a "team" defines us once again. We're a couple – more than just ourselves. Our decisions must be shared. We are defined once again.

Then we have children. The most defining moment. We are totally changed. Now, another human being, not ourselves becomes most important. We discover a love we could never (con't on page 2)

# 7 Things I Have Learned Since the Loss of My Child

Child loss is a loss like no other. One often misunderstood by many. If you love a bereaved parent or know someone who does, remember that even his or her "good" days are harder than you could ever imagine. Compassion and love, not advice, are needed. If you'd like an inside look into why the loss of a child is a grief that lasts a lifetime, here is what I've learned in my seven years of trekking through the unimaginable.

#### 1). Love never dies.

There will never come a day, hour, minute or second I stop loving or thinking about my son. Just as parents of living children unconditionally love their children always and forever, so do bereaved parents. I want to say and hear his name just the same as non-bereaved parents do. I want to speak about my deceased children as normally and naturally as you speak of your living ones.

I love my child just as much as you love yours—the only difference is mine lives in heaven and talking about him is unfortunately quite taboo in our culture. I hope to change that. Our culture isn't so great about hearing about children gone too soon, but that doesn't stop me from saying my son's name and sharing his love and light everywhere I go. Just because it might make you uncomfortable, doesn't make him matter any less. My son's life was cut irreversibly short, but his love lives on forever. And ever.

#### 2). Bereaved parents share an unspeakable bond.

In my seven years navigating the world as a bereaved parent, I am continually struck by the power of the bond between bereaved parents. Strangers become kindreds in mere seconds - (con't on page 2)

have imagined. It changes us totally. We now recognize what our parents always knew. We see the world through a totally different prism. Everything we do affects this new person. We have the incredible opportunity to imbue this pure innocence with our values, our ethics, our beliefs. It's an amazing life experience—bigger than anything we could have imagined, in spite of what we've been told or witnessed. It's a feeling that has no words. Our parenthood now defines who we are. We now fit into a community of 'parents'. Everyone knows about parenthood. If the kids have a need—a play date, a sports game, a party—these needs take precedence over all other needs. The world revolves around the children. "Do you have children?" is the common thread that connects us all.

Then a child dies. It brings a whole new definition to our lives. This is one life experience that is even bigger than those we lived before. Now we are "bereaved" parents. It will define us more than any other life experience we have lived through. We will grieve this loss, learn about a pain that has never been felt or adequately described, and spend the rest of our lives missing, loving, longing and wondering ... we will look at the world through a prism of sadness and knowing about impossible possibilities. This is a life experience that defines us more than any other. We will be challenged to learn how to absorb and carry this burden so that is it invisible to the 'civilians' among us. Unlike the old crones of days gone by, we will not be wrapped in black, shrouded in the cloak of grief that the unknowing may expect of us. We will learn to keep our lost children in the here and now where they belong. We will talk about them. We will share what they meant to us - how they defined us in life - they can help to define us now.

I am a bereaved parent. In spite of how I live my life, how productive I am, how capable I've become of enjoying the little things—I still see the world through the prism of my loss. Now, though I smile, I am always aware of what my beloved child and I am missing. I will always be sad about that. But I will always know what Peter brought to my life—definition. I know what it is to have a child. I know about the indescribable love that child brings. I will always be his mother. I am mostly defined by that.

### How to do this? And Why?

Some people keep a journal – a useful tool in any event – but maybe especially now, when our lives are apt to be in emotional turmoil. To write down whatever is preoccupying us – snatches of memory, accounts of daily grief and confusion – not only helps us identify and sort out what is happening, but puts all of that in a safe, re-ordered place where we can get back to it if we want to. To write it down relieves us of the need to carry it around in our head all the time.

Some write down stories from the life of the loved one. A dear friend spent several months following his wife's death writing down the story of their courtship, more than sixty-five year ago. It was not only a beautiful story – and a prospective treasure for close family members – but, as he said, "it helped me keep in touch with her."

a look, a glance, a knowing of the heart connects us, even if we've never met before. No matter our circumstances, who we are, or how different we are, there is no greater bond than the connection between parents who understand the agony of enduring the death of a child. It's a pain we suffer for a lifetime, and unfortunately only those who have walked the path of child loss understand the depth and breadth of both the pain and the love we carry.

#### 3). I will grieve for a lifetime.

Period. The end. There is no "moving on," or "getting over it." There is no bow, no fix, no solution to my heartache. There is no end to the ways I will grieve and for how long I will grieve. There is no glue for my broken heart, no exilir for my pain, no going back in time. For as long as I breathe, I will grieve and ache and love my son with all my heart and soul. There will never come a time where I won't think about who my son would be, what he would look like, and how he would be woven perfectly into the tapestry of my family. I wish people could understand that grief lasts forever because love lasts forever; that the loss of a child is not one finite event, it is a continuous loss that unfolds minute by minute over the course of a lifetime. Every missed birthday, holiday, milestone—should-be back-to-school school years and graduations; weddings that will never be; grandchildren that should have been but will never be born—an entire generation of people are irrevocably altered forever.

This is why grief lasts forever. The ripple effect lasts forever. The bleeding never stops.

# 4). It's a club I can never leave, but is filled with the most shining souls I've ever known.

This crappy club called child loss is a club I never wanted to join, and one I can never leave, yet is filled with some of the best people I've ever known. And yet we all wish we could jump ship—that we could have met another way—any other way but this. Alas, these shining souls are the most beautiful, compassionate, grounded, loving, movers, shakers and healers I have ever had the honor of knowing. They are life-changers, game-changers, relentless survivors and thrivers. Warrior moms and dads who redefine the word brave.

Every day, loss parents move mountains in honor of their children gone too soon. They start movements, change laws, spearhead crusades of tireless activism. Why? In the hope that even just one parent could be spared from joining the club. If you've ever wondered who some of the greatest world changers are, hang out with a few bereaved parents and watch how they live, see what they do in a day, a week, a lifetime. Watch how they alchemize their grief into a force to be reckoned with, watch how they turn tragedy into transformation, loss into legacy.

Love is the most powerful force on earth, and the love between a bereaved parent and his/her child is a lifeforce to behold. Get to know a bereaved parent. You'll be thankful you did.

#### 5). The empty chair/room/space never becomes less empty.

Empty chair, empty room, empty space in every family picture. Empty, vacant, forever gone for this lifetime. Empty spaces that should be full, everywhere we go. There is and will always be a missing space in our lives, our families, a forever-hole-in-our-hearts. Time does not make the space less empty. Neither do platitudes, clichés or well-wishes for us to "move on," or "stop dwelling," from well intentioned friends or family. Nothing does. No matter how you look at it, empty is still empty. Missing is still missing. Gone is still gone. The problem is nothing can fill it. Minute after minute, hour after hour, day after day, month after month, year after heart-breaking year the empty space remains.

The empty space of our missing child(ren) lasts a lifetime. And so we rightfully miss them forever. Help us by holding the space of that truth for us.

# 6). No matter how long it's been, holidays never become easier without my son.

Never, ever. Have you ever wondered why every holiday season is like torture for a bereaved parent? Even if it's been 5, 10, or 25 years later? It's because they really, truly are. Imagine if you had to live every holiday without one or more of your precious children. Imagine how that might feel for you. It would be easier to lose an arm, a leg or two—anything—than to live without your flesh and blood, without the beat of your heart. Almost anything would be easier than living without one or more of your precious children. That is why holidays are always and forever hard for bereaved parents. Don't wonder why or even try to understand. Know you don't have to understand in order to be a supportive presence. Consider supporting and loving some bereaved parents this holiday season. It will be the best gift you could ever give them.

# 7). Because I know deep sorrow, I also know unspeakable joy.

Though I will grieve the death of my son forever and then some, it does not mean my life is lacking happiness and joy. Quite the contrary, in fact, though it took a while to get there. It is not either/or, it's both/and. My life is more rich now. I live from a deeper place. I love deeper still. Because I grieve, I also know a joy like no other. The joy I experience now is far deeper and more intense than the joy I experienced before my loss. Such is the alchemy of grief.

Because I've clawed my way from the depth of unimaginable pain, suffering and sorrow, again and again—when the joy comes, however and whenever it does—it is a joy that reverberates through every pore of my skin and every bone in my body. I feel all of it, deeply: the love, the grief, the joy, the pain. I embrace and thank every morsel of it. My life now is more rich and vibrant and full, not despite my loss, but because of it. In grief there are gifts, sometimes many. These gifts don't in any way make it all "worth" it, but I am grateful beyond words for each and every gift that comes my way. I bow my head to each one and say thank you, thank you, thank you. Because there is nothing—and I mean absolutely nothing—I take for granted. Living life in this way gives me greater joy than I've ever known possible.

I have my son to thank for that. Being his mom is the best gift I've ever been given.

Even death can't take that away.

# Reflections on Attending a TCF Conference

It's a funny thing about expectations. They are almost designed to be challenged.

When my brother Russell died, many of the people I had expectations to be there for me let me down. It was ultimately strangers and situations I had NO expectations of that stepped up and became my source of hope and connection.

I just recently attended my 17th TCF National Conference. It's always one of the highlights of my year, and the fact that it comes on the heels of the anniversary of Russell's death every year is supremely helpful in being able to process my feelings and express my yearning for what can never be in a place where people really understand.

The irony is that I went to my first TCF conference fully convinced that it wasn't for me. It wasn't going to be helpful. What could possibly be helpful?

I was essentially bribed, like many fellow TCF siblings that I have met in the years since. My parents started going to TCF 3 weeks after Russell died. They kept mentioning to me that there was a siblings group. Eventually, I went so they would shut up about it. I figured, I'd go, it wouldn't be helpful, and we'd never have to talk about it again. Now I run my local chapter, and they barely come.

The local meetings WERE helpful. Having a place to ask the unanswerables, a place to vent about my isolation and my problems relating to the world, was perhaps the ONLY thing that was helpful. And yet I was still resistant to go to a conference. A grief conference? What a bummer of a weekend that sounded like. My parents assured me I could treat it like a vacation. It was in Boston, where I had a number of friends, the hotel had a pool I could hang out at.

I have to say that first conference almost turned me off from coming back. I was not really open to sitting in these different sessions. I met a couple people, but I mostly kept to myself. The next two conferences were in cities where I didn't know anyone, and had no desire to visit.

So my next actual conference was in Nashville. I had become more comfortable in the TCF space, having started facilitating my local sibs group when my mom became Chapter Leader. (facilitator training took place AT my parents apt, where I was living at the time, so I really couldn't get out of it.)

Nashville was the conference where I was hooked. The full immersive experience was intoxicating in a really good way. It was the first place where I realized that it didn't matter which version of myself I presented, whichever version of myself showed up was welcome. It was the first place where I was able to socialize again, and talk about my brother with people who wanted to hear about him! I got to hear stories about OTHER peoples siblings too!

The workshops at the conference are always great, and while there are always plenty of options, I still find the most impactful part of the weekend to be all the in-between times. It's really the place where I relearned how to BE again. To exist.

It's still funny to me how much I look forward to this conference every year. I certainly never thought this would be a regular thing in my life. In the early days of my grief, it scared me to think that I'd still be sitting in these sad circles 20 years later. And yet, I can't imagine my life without (con't in next column)
