About the Worldwide Candle Lighting

The Compassionate Friends Worldwide Candle Lighting on the 2nd Sunday in December unites family and friends around the globe in lighting candles for one hour to honor the memories of the sons, daughters, brothers, sisters, and grandchildren who left too soon. As candles are lit on December 14th, 2025 at 7:00 pm local time, hundreds of thousands of people around the globe commemorate and honor the memory of all children gone too soon.

Now believed to be the largest mass candle lighting on the globe, the annual Worldwide Candle Lighting (WCL), a gift to the bereavement community from The Compassionate Friends, creates a virtual 24-hour wave of light as it moves from time zone to time zone. TCF's WCL started in the United States in 1997 as a small internet observance when congress declared the second Sunday in December, "Children's Memorial Day" and has since swelled in numbers as word has spread

ALTERED STATES

From the time we are born, our personalities are shaped by our chemistry, our environment and our experience. Our state of mind is a result of these human factors. My life, until Peter's death in 1993, had a typical series of "ups" and "downs". My perspective and my responses were molded by my chemistry, my environment and my accumulated experience. But nothing in my life prepared me for what was, is, and always will be a calamitous experience so devastating that it has chemically rearranged me into what might be termed an altered state.

In the beginning, my confusion was so total I had no desire to go on living. Peter, an only child, was the core around which my life and my future revolved. With my future removed I was incapable of redesigning my life. With Peter gone, I found myself in unexplored territory with no desire to learn to navigate or survive. With no surviving children to motivate me it took my grieving husband (now fearful of losing me too), to remind me that as long as I lived, Peter would live. That thought, giving Peter's memory life, is what gives my altered life meaning to this day.

No one who has not lost a child can imagine how we, the terminally bereaved, look at life. Ours is a perspective permanently changed by catastrophic events impossible to have anticipated...and therefore impossible for us to have even suspected the behavioral changes that might become necessary to survive. It puts us in a place that will remain strange, unfamiliar and unbelievable for the rest of our lives.

Those with no surviving children are particularly impacted, especially at the prospect of impending old age. I remember how my mother was concerned about the material treasures she had lovingly collected throughout her life as well as those she had inherited from her mother. It comforted her to know that the memories inherent in these artifacts would continue on in the compendium of life, continuing to decorate the lives of her children and grandchildren. For me there is no such comfort. My treasures and the memories contained within them are destined to be scattered in a meaningless dispersal.

In my altered state, I watch the grandmas and the grandpas I see on a winter weekend in Florida, delighting in a visit from their children and grandchildren – a joy and a continuum I will never know. Sure, not everyone has kids. Childless by choice or circumstance, their lives are designed accordingly. Their expectations don't include grandchildren. How do we incorporate that acceptance into lives that always anticipated the futurity of grandchildren?

Old age. I watched my parents deal with it. I dealt with it. With love and concern I accompanied both my parents through the last years of their lives. I did everything I could to make that period in their lives as comfortable and filled with joy as I could. Who will do that for us?

As a meaningful birthday, holiday or anniversary approaches, I listen as my contemporaries talk about the celebrations planned for them by or with their children. Though Peter often referred to these, then future, celebrations, he is gone and we must endure the significance these times might have had – permanently focused on what might have been.

OLYMPICS OF THE SOUL

These are the last few days of autumn. Soon the last of the leaves will fall, the days will grow mercifully shorter, the temperature will drop and we will retreat to the safe comfort of home. For just a brief period, we can watch the world from the safety of the nest, not enticed out into the games of summer by well meaning friends and family, intent on our participation. We need this time to prepare for the next Olympics of the soul...the Holidays.

So much has been written about getting through the holidays when you are grieving. The intensity of the pain of the recently bereaved, the suggestions of how to manage by the experienced griever, the wistful thoughts of the poets...so much to be said about this particular period of survival. Truth is, the holidays are only a tad more difficult than every other day. Like salt in a wound, the over-the-top joyousness adds an extra dose of emotional pain. But I've come to realize that many who "celebrate" the holidays are also fellow travelers along this grieving path. They're just further ahead than many of us are. I'm still not up to the festivities. For me it remains a time of introspection. With absolutely no opportunity to mourn our losses at this time of year, I choose to remain as low key as possible and venture back into the ebb and flow of days only after New Year's Eve.

It's not possible for the uninitiated to comprehend the emotional roller coaster we are on now. But I recently came across a column written by an Australian Mom. Though not written with the holidays in mind, it expresses for me the way I spend much of my time during this particular season. I wanted to share it with you.

If Only They Knew...

If only they knew when I speak of him, I am not being morbid, I am not denying his death. I am proclaiming his life. I am learning to live with his absence. For twenty-six years he was a part of my life, born, nurtured, molded and loved; this cannot be put aside to please those who are uncomfortable with my grief.

If only they knew that when I sit quietly, apparently content with my own company, I am not self indulgently unhappy, dwelling on things which cannot be changed; I am with him, I am seeing his face, hearing his voice, remembering his laughter, recalling his excitement and joy in life. Please allow me this time with him as I do not begrudge you your time with your children.

If only they knew when I sometimes weep quietly, I do not cry in self-pity for what I have lost. I weep for what he has lost; for the life he loved, for the music which filled his very being and for all he still longed to hear, for the poetry which moved him to tears, for the beauty about him that daily fed his soul, for the exhilaration and excitement of flying the skies, of searching for his God in the vast space of the universe. For all that he loved and lost, I cry.

If only they knew the feeling of deep grief, the emptiness and dull pain, the endlessness of death. If only they understood the insanity of the platitudes so freely spoken; that "time heals", that "you'll get over it", that "it was for the best", that "God takes only the best", that "he's in a better place", and realize that these are more an insult than a comfort, that the

Memories are always there to hook us, to make the grief fresh again – birthdays, anniversaries, summer vacation, - any occasion of "the first time around" without our loved one. I know this will be a hard season for me. I will take one day at a time. I will acknowledge when grief hovers close. And I will try to be open to times when joy may surprise me, too.

The holiday season is a stressful time for everyone, and it seems to me that it starts earlier every year. During a time that we are supposed to be thankful for all that we have in the world, many of us tend only to see what we don't. As much as Valentine's Day reminds single people that they don't have that special someone in their lives, so does the Holiday season remind me that I don't have my brother. Families come back together. Siblings return home from college, or from wherever they've moved to, reconnecting at parties with friends from years past. Every thing on TV shows happy, fully intact families whose only real crises are a drunk family member and/or where to buy a toy on Christmas Eve.

After celebrating at a friend's house party, we indulged in a crazy bar hopping night through the streets of North Beach.

These days, I miss him often throughout the time from Thanksgiving to New Year's. It's still the time of year people come home, still the time of year everyone is having a holiday party, reunions of family and friends. Every December for the last five years, I've walked through the month in a daze, from one party to the next, looking for anything to distract me from looking forward. I feel like December is the only month no one will call you a lush, everybody's looking to escape something.

As the New Year draws closer, I am actually looking forward to it this year. For the second year in a row, my family and I will be having a party at our apartment to celebrate Russell's birthday. I found last year's celebration to be very low key and comforting, surrounded by those who wanted to hear about Russell, who wanted to celebrate with us, with HIM. The stress free environment actually allowed me to go out after the countdown and have a good time. This year I hope for the same possibility of good fortune and revelry. Whatever I do after midnight will not be filled with sadness, as I remind myself it will be the beginning of a new year, a fresh start, and perhaps a reunion with myself.

A LETTER TO FAMILY AND FRIENDS

Thank you for not expecting too much from me this holiday season.

It will be our first Christmas without our child and I have all I can do coping with the "spirit of the holiday" on the radio, TV, in the newspapers, and stores. We do not feel joyous and trying to pretend this Christmas is going to be like the last will be impossible because we are missing one.

Our family traditions will be too painful for us to continue this year. Please understand this and maybe some Christmas in the future we will have these traditions again.

Please allow me to talk about my child, if I feel a need. Don't be uncomfortable with my tears. My heart is breaking and the tears are a way of letting out my sadness.

I plan to do something special in memory of my child. Please recognize my need to do this in order to keep our memories alive. My fear is not that I'll forget, but that you will.

Please don't criticize me if I do something that you don't think is normal. I'm a different person now and it may take a long time before this different person reaches an acceptance of my child's death.

As I survive the stages of grief, I will need your patience and support, especially during these holiday times and the "special" days throughout the year.

Thank you for not expecting too much from me this holiday season.

Happy Chanukah

There are various ways we include Johnny in our Chanukah celebrations. Some are subtle and others more overt. When we light the menorah, we use a blue taper as the extra candle. The color blue represents Johnny to us. Just as the extra candle gives of itself to light each of the other candles without giving up its own light, we give Johnny and each other our love without diminishing ourselves. After the meal and before we exchange gifts and play games, we say the Kaddish (mourners prayer). This demonstrates our faith in God despite our loss. It insists that we focus on hope rather than despair and our determination to pass on loving memories of Johnny from generation to generation. Shalom.

Love Never Dies; A Mother's Journey From Loss to Love by Sandy Goodman. Sandra shares her story in a way that will help you find your own path through your most private pain. You too, can emerge from the deepest hurt and darkness into the awareness that the loves you lost still remain with you in so many ways.

Beyond Tears: Living After Losing Child. Revised edition with a brand new chapter written by young adults. Nine mothers who met in a support group give cpmfort and direction to bereaved parents. They candidly chare with other grieving parents what to expect in the first year and beyond.

Into The Valley and Out Again: The Story of a Father's Journey by Richard Edler. After the unexpected death of his son, Rich's life seems to stop. The next few years were spent climbing out of the bottom of a valley he had not known existed before. It is a story about what is important in life, sorrow, faith, acceptance and rebirth.

Reading other bereaved people's stories helps us. Take advantage of these resources. Discovering how much of what we feel is being experienced by fellow travelers helps us understand the process and restores hope.
