Winter of our Souls

It is winter today. There is no sun, not even a flash of light to focus on. The air has become murky as if it has solidified, losing its clarity. Ice covers everything, smothering any life that might have been.

Staring out my window, I compare the bite of winter to my grief: the coldness, the shadows, and my reluctance to breathe in any more discomfort. Grief, like winter, appears uninvited and unwelcome. We abhor the pain and wonder why we must endure the distress, while all along we feel the imminent arrival.

Winter compels the earth to rest. Everything stops struggling, stops performing, and sleeps. Abruptly, nature's need to "do" is gone and "being" is all that is necessary. All that was living before appears lifeless. The leaves disappear from the trees, flowers no longer grace our gardens, and the grass is entombed by snow. But what is going on beneath that which we see? Are the flowers really gone, or are they only changing . . . becoming new, becoming different?

I ponder how much further I dare go with this. Can I contend that grief, like winter, is a gift? Can I talk about the metamorphosis of grief, and contemplate gratitude for its presence? I do not know, but that is where my thoughts are leading me.

Grief necessitates a sabbatical from living. We stop struggling, stop performing, and freeze. Our compulsion to "do" dissolves, and "being" is all that is possible. Our life as we knew it disappears, dreams are shattered, and our hearts are ripped from us in the blink of an eye. We are gone, lost in our grief. But what is transpiring in our heart? Is everything gone, or is it only changing . . . becoming new, becoming different?

Grief is harsher than winter. The tasks of daily living are amplified, and what was once soft and blurred becomes sharp and ragged. While winter invariably ends and I remember that spring will arrive, grief makes no such promise. I must wait without assurance. There are moments when winter is beautiful: a blanket of fresh snow on Christmas morning or the surprise of a warm breeze in February. There are nights when winter is hard and ugly, when temperatures plummet and the howl of the wind threatens our sanity. Grief is the same. A special memory comes into my heart and grief becomes bittersweet . . . beautiful. Then, a letter addressed to my son arrives in the mail, and I am back to the harsh reality that he is gone.

My grief transformed me. It tore out everything within me and said There! It is GONE! What are you going to do?

You have NOTHING LEFT TO HANG ON TO! You must begin again. You must change.

And change is what I did. As winter alters the earth, my grief changed me. It gave me a period of time to step back from living and just be, a space in my existence to feel only that which I needed to feel. It was a time for reflection, reprioritizing, and searching. Without it, I would remain as empty as a garden that never rests.

"But it was painful, horrifying, and devastating," you say. "How can you be thankful for such a thing?"

Grief, like winter, freezes our world. Both appear painful, horrify-

ing, and devastating, but it is our preparation for, reaction to, and perception of that creates our discomfort. It is our need to judge which labels discomfort as bad. If we deny that death is possible for those we love, we will be stunned and terrified by its occurrence. If we react to the first blizzard of winter with panic and fear, we will be too afraid to honor its power. If we perceive a fatal ice storm as an act of God, we will shake our fist at Him and spend more time than we have asking why. And if we distinguish death as the end of a loved one's existence, we will be eternally saddened by their absence. The path to spring, to the end of winter, requires only our patience and perseverance. The path to healing requires that and more: it requires that we learn to think differently.

We are a society that fears death. We consider it an end to life, love, and all that came before. Those who die either cease to be, or they exist in a place that is unavailable to us. It is not surprising that fear is present. However, if we alter our beliefs, we can then change our preparation for, reaction to, and perception of death. If we come to know that death is a change in form and not an end, we will not eliminate the winters of our grieving, but we will lessen our suffering.

When my son died in 1996, I had no other option but to change my thinking. I could not live another day presuming he no longer existed. By saying to myself often I am changing my perception of death, I announced to the universe and my higher self that I intended to change what I believed. I placed my intent, reached for it, and settled for nothing less.

I began searching for and finding information to support my new perception. I read books about life after death, mediumship, after death communication, spirituality, and reincarnation. I perused websites, subscribed to email lists, and joined chats where these topics were addressed. I found like-minded friends who understood what I was feeling. I observed mediumship activities on television, at seminars, and on the Internet. I began to support my new belief system with knowledge.

I invited experiences by talking to Jason and asking him to come to me in a dream or to give me a sign of his presence. I meditated and made myself more aware of that which isn't seen or touched. I opened up a doorway of possibility and welcomed all that came from love to enter.

Finally, I accepted what happened and expressed gratitude. When the lights went off and then on again for no apparent reason, I was quick to say "thank you." If I was only thanking the power company, it didn't matter. No one knew. The more I accepted as real, the more I experienced. We hear often that "seeing is believing," but this is about "believing is seeing."

My journey has been both desolate and inspiring. There have been moments when I thought the cold and darkness would never end, and moments when tears of joy washed away the pain and light permeated my being. I invite you to walk the path of grief a little differently: to nurture winter's bleakness and look deep into its purpose. And just as we must think differently to see winter's grace, we must think differently to see the gift of grief. It is there, buried beneath a frozen crust that protects and restores while the winter of our soul . . . ensues.

SIBLING GRIEF

I was a sophomore in high school when my little brother, Arthur, was killed. As a sad coincidence, the woman who killed him was the secretary in my school. I must have seen her at school the day he was killed, but I am not able to consciously remember it. I can't remember seeing Arthur lying in the street either, though I know I did. All I can recall is being horrified and needing to get away from there. I took my younger brother home and never saw Arthur again. It was the dreadful beginning of a very long and painful journey.

The pain of grief is unavoidable; so is the family disruption. What can be changed however, is the length of the grieving process. Unfortunately for our family, we were given no help, and we stayed a mess for a very long time. I would like to share some of my experiences in the hope that it will help you to cope with your brother or sister's death.

The first thing I can remember is not knowing how to act or what to do. I felt terribly alone and awkward. I was shocked. One minute was a nice normal day and the next everything was changed. I didn't know how I was supposed to act at school. Part of me wanted to tell everybody what had happened and part of me didn't want to talk to anyone at all. I felt guilty for getting some comfort from the attention. (I asked myself if this meant I was "glad" that my brother had died.) But on the other hand, I felt as if people would think I didn't care when I said nothing. It hurt either way. One way I dealt with my grief was by being sarcastic and laughing whenever something painful came up. I laughed outside but I think my friends knew I was crying inside. Most people don't know how to help us, but hopefully you will have someone you can talk to. If not, perhaps you will be able to talk about how you feel at home.

Home becomes a pain-filled place. Our parents have been hurt very, very badly. They aren't the parents we knew before. The biggest mistake I made in my grief was trying to "fix" my parents' pain. I wished for and acted in ways that I hoped would change them back to happy, whole people again. I know now that it was not my responsibility to do this. In fact, I couldn't do it. No matter how "good" I was, or how much I tried to make our home pleasant, they were still sad. The bad thing was, by trying to make them better, I stuffed a lot of my own sadness, tears and worries inside. This added more problems to my grief. In some ways it felt better to worry about them instead of myself but as I got older those painful old memories wouldn't stay covered up anymore. It is like a splinter that gets covered up with skin and feels better until the infection sets in; then it hurts so much more when it comes out. We have to take care of ourselves, and trust our parents to take care of themselves.

For years I rarely cried about my brother. I always thought something was strange about that. It was years before I was able to let the tears flow. Then I cried for him and for me. I cried for Arthur because he was dead and I cried for myself because of all I had missed. I missed feeling happiness in myself and my family. I missed feeling safe and secure. I missed the attention my parents were no longer able to give me. I missed the years of carefree childhood that were ripped away. These are all losses that we grieve for besides the loss of our brother or sister.

It hurts. Yes, it does. Cry about it. Laugh about it. Write about it. Pray about it. Just don't try to bury it. It won't work in the long run. And you know...I can do all those things today and it doesn't hurt nearly as much as it did when I started.

Another thing I now realize is that my feelings about my brother's death were not the same as my parents'. I used to think I didn't love my brother because I wasn't sad as long as they were. They hated the holidays, but I wanted the fun they brought. They couldn't be happy. I could, especially after the first terrible set of holidays. Our parents have the right to be sad because that's how they are feeling. We have the right to be happy if that's how we are feeling. Each one of my brothers and sisters had their own feelings. Each was sad, happy, regretful in their own way and time. We grieved with separate timetables. Sometimes we shared feelings, and many times they were different. None of us, however badly we felt, came close to having the depth of pain my parents did. I didn't understand that then as I do now. This is an important thing to know so we don't feel guilty about getting on with our lives.

Another thing I remember is that I used to think about things I did or did not do with my brother before he died. I felt guilty because I didn't play with him the last time he wanted me to. Of course I didn't know he was going to die. I remember times when I got mad at him and yelled at him for no good reason. I felt guilt about that too. I can now realize what I did or didn't do had nothing to do with his death. It is easy to take on guilt, so we have to be careful not to. One of my brothers has always felt guilt because it was his bicycle Arthur was riding when he was killed. My brother did not kill Arthur. The woman who was driving her car did. It is important not to blame ourselves. Even if we did have a part in the death (or think we did), we must forgive ourselves. Certainly we didn't deliberately do it.

One last thing that has stayed with me is a fear of dying and of death. After Arthur was killed, I suddenly noticed that death was

predictable period of time. Disappointment can be defined as the result of missed expectations. And what greater disappointment is there than the loss of a child and the expected future we had hoped for but lost. Coming to terms with that disappointment may take a lifetime and though it may always be with us, along the way we continue to experience life in all its varying forms but always seen through the prism of loss. How we experience the world after such loss changes us, but those around us are not changed. The stage is then set for more and more disappointment as our expectations and those of our extended family and friends become more and more misaligned.

Looking back at my own experience, I can't remember what it felt like to be bereaved at five years or at ten, at seven years or at twelve years. I vividly remember what it felt like to be bereaved that first and second year...maybe even the third year. But all the other years in my memory feel the same. Like it does today. I long for my son. I miss him every minute, every day of my life. So much happens that I wish I could share with him. So much of what might have been his life continues to occupy my thoughts. The love continues. And so does the disappointment.

I guess what has changed are my expectations. And along with those, my disappointments have changed as well. I no longer expect people to acknowledge Peter's special days – his birthday and the anniversary of his leaving. I no longer expect people to acknowledge that I am forever bereaved. I recognize that most people think I am "over it" and it no longer bothers me. (Well, maybe a little.) My friends' lives continue and change as they watch their own children grow and expand their lives. I only grow older. Nothing eventful or memorable or hopeful inhabits my days.

My own family has almost disappeared from my life. And that is okay I suppose. I am not forever exposed to their joy and happiness and am not required to comment or participate in their lives. In a funny way, that's made it easier for me. My total disappointment in them and the way they abandoned me during my darkest days made it easy for me to distance myself from them. They can't disappoint me anymore.

There is an upside to what would seem to be pretty sad. Truth is I lead a very full life, a life filled with great friendships, a magnificent garden, and travel unencumbered by family requirements. It's a life redesigned by circumstance. I miss my son desperately, but I enjoy the lives of those I've chosen to be close to me. Life's greatest disappointment has made me impervious to all the others.

real. A friend from school died, a cousin died, and two of my pets died. Even now it is almost like I expect people to die around me. Whenever I travel, I ask when I get back, "is everybody okay?" Fortunately, there have been many times I expected death and it didn't happen, but the fear is still there. I frequently remind myself that and that helps. I also try to use the awareness of death's reality to value others in my life right now.

My brother's death definitely changed my life. It brought pain and unhappiness, but it also brought awareness of other people's pain and the ability to understand and help others. I hope you can take something from my experience and use it in your grief – and maybe you can pass it on someday, too.

Reading other bereaved people's stories helps us. Take advantage of these resources. Discovering how much of what we feel is being experienced by fellow travelers helps us understand the process and restores hope.
