Some Thoughts on Long Term Grief... describing what was my joy...

This essay was originally written in 2007. I've done a wee bit of editing but in reading it again I realize what a valuable exercise writing it was then, and how meaningful it is to me now, remembering so many years later, some of the specifics that having Peter and losing him, impacted my perspective on life. For those new to this life, writing down some of the thoughts rattling around in your heads, may prove to be as much of a gift to you down the road, as this piece is to me...

I look at his pictures. Six portraits taken just a few months before he died... a photo shoot designed to get a press photo of me that turned into an opportunity to get him in front of the camera as the roll of film ran out. The last photo – the two of us cheek to cheek – me clinging to my beautiful son for all of time. Portraits frozen in time, that stare down at me from the walls in every room. Him smiling at me ... the pictures are such a gift. I smile back at him. I'm so grateful for the images.

My grief is middle aged. Almost three decades without my beloved child. So much time spent trying to recover and reinvent myself. I've been sifting through old papers and come upon a letter I wrote more than twenty years ago to someone who asked me to tell them about Peter. Reading it again brings back all the drama that was my son, killed in a stupid car accident when he was barely 22. I said then that they were random thoughts but realize now that they are thoughts that even so many years later, continue to roll around in my brain... not random at all. Only the earthly chaos that took him from me was random.

... I think about a ten-year-old with red, rosy cheeks, getting on his bike on a cold winter morning and going to get me the news-paper...

... I think about the enterprising 12-year-old riding his bike in the city, hanging around at the 23rd street marina in the hope of being asked to run and errand or two... for tips...

... I think of him taking care of the neighbor's cats...

... I think about how I never had to wake him up for school... ... I think about the nervous teenager we took to his new high school, and how overwhelmed and nervous he was that day. And I remember how he made that world his own and became a wellknown personality in a community of more than 5000 kids.

... I think about how important it was to Peter that we were proud of him... and how well he succeeded.

... I think about how everybody who ever met him commented on how terrific he was.

 \ldots I think about how he always worried about me \ldots and how good it made me feel.

... I think about him calling me at work and suggesting he make spaghetti for dinner.

 \ldots I think about all the neighbors who used to stop me and tell me what a lovely young man he was.

... I think about how close he was to my mom, how he worried about her and cared for her during her last years...

... I think about how she taught him to cook and how he loved the fact that he was better at it than me.

Thoughts on Long Term Grief...describing my joy...(con't from left column)

... I think about how he never let me worry when he went out with friends, how he always called to let me know where he was and when he would be late coming home.

... I think about how he called me every day after school. And I think about how he called me every Friday and Sunday nights when he was away at college...

...I think about how funny he was, how he delighted in making me laugh and how his Dad called me his laugh track.

...I think about how he delighted in having a girlfriend and how devastated he was when they broke up. I think about how he came into my room and woke me in the middle of that night because he needed to talk about it, and how he cried like a baby when he told me how heartbroken he was.

... I think about all the errands and chores around the house that we counted on him for...

... I think about all the times he took me to and picked me up from the airport..

... I think about how he rescued me when I had trouble parallel parking the car...

I think about my mother, and I think about how I cared for her during those last years when her health was failing. And I wonder... who will be there for me? I think about all that life has in store and I wonder... how will I manage without my son to help me get through?

I think of how proud we were of him – of all he achieved, all he accomplished, all the hope, all the promise, the kudos, the accolades heaped upon him – for his kindness, his humor, his potential. I think every day about what he would be doing if he were here.

I think of the daughter-in-law I would have loved to shop with and decorate with. I think about what a terrific father he would have been. I think then, of all the grandchildren I will never have.

I think about all the Thanksgivings I will have to endure without him... all the special times that will continue to happen in the world... without him.

There is more... so much more. When he graduated from Syracuse just three months before he died, I wrote him a letter. In it I told him how proud we were of him and that he turned out "better than if I had designed you myself!" Such a rich collection of memories. I am so fortunate to have them.

We begin another year – another winter followed by a season of rebirth and renewal. While I ruminate on thoughts of what might have been, I continue to look forward to better times, warmer weather and another sunny day. No doubt it's the shorter days and the longer nights that turn my thoughts inward. But oh, in my memories, Peter continues to delight me. I cannot help but smile, when I remember.

Siblings

The Forgotten Ones

"How are your parents doing?" I hear it all the time. That gentle tone, The lowered eyes. The implications.

They say that when you lose a parent you lose your past, and when you lose a child, you lose your future. What they leave out is when you lose a sibling, you lose both.

Less than a year ago, my 17-year-old brother died in a car accident. Since Ryan's death, I have learned what its like to be The Forgotten Mourner. That's what the siblings are called by books and support groups. People's thoughts and prayers automatically go to the parents. And why shouldn't they? Most of them are parents too. Losing a child is one of the most difficult ordeals life can chuck at you. I've been a constant witness, watching as my parents turbulently survive losing their son. I see my mother's open weeping, her small body crushed by the weight of grief, and my father's silent sorrow, his outbursts of anger. I see them suffer, but I'm suffering too.

The grief of a sibling is complex, it goes beyond the simple sadness of loss. There is a pressure to redefine myself. To take care of my parents. To protect them. To not fuck up. To not die. This burden is added to the heaviness of sorrow. There is also alienation, the depression, the grief. The lost sleep. Lost appetites. Lost friends.

My future is gone, the future as I intended, as I planned it to be. People are cruelly optimistic: you can still get married. Have babies, live the way you're supposed to. Get on with your life. Fill biological urges. Find a job. Buy a house. They see the future as full of possible joy for the girl who lost her brother. But every moment of joy will be coupled with suffocating absence. The brother-in-law my husband never knew. The uncle my child never met.

I was at the hospital too. I sat with my brother in the ICU. I held his hand. I cried over his bed, hot tears of anger, frustration, anxiety, and fear. Shaking from the terror of the suddenly possible. I was there when Ryan was declared brain dead. Dead. I couldn't breathe. I was shaking, bawling, and panting. I had to be taken down to the emergency room because I was having a panic attack. The screaming inside me was muffled by the Xanax they gave me, but I was still screaming.

I was at the wake too, and the funeral. I was hugged by a long line of mourners who couldn't think of anything else to do. There was nothing else to do. They kneeled in front of my brother's open casket. The damage to his head that caused his death was covered by a beloved white hat. Ryan looked tranquil, like when he fell asleep on the couch watching TV after school. "It must be so hard for his parents," they said as they looked down at my handsome brother. "His poor mother," they said. "This is every father's nightmare." His sister unmentioned. Forgotten.
