All my friends have now moved into the 'next' phase of their lives. The grief has been covered over with layer upon layer of life experience. Oh, the grief is still there, but no longer on the surface. Now, like an archeological dig, we find ourselves thinking back through layers.

The last of my old friends' surviving child just became engaged. That means she will soon be a grandmother and despite the fact that she is a bereaved parent, she now has an exciting future to look forward to. All my friends are now grandparents. And although several have offered to share, every grandchild becomes another painful reminder that I will never ever have one of my own. How many of my grandchildren died that day in 1993.

Sometimes I think about how I appear to the world. Pretty together I suspect. I rush to work several times a week. I capably perform all those tasks that are expected of me by people who have no idea about my life. I smile, I laugh. I listen. And sometimes I catch myself actually enjoying

I used to care about what people thought. It used to bother me that those who have known me through all the years think I'm 'over it'. What's so interesting now, so many years later, is that I no longer care what anybody thinks. If it makes them more comfortable to think I am my 'old self' - that's okay. . I no longer have the need to remind them that I am always conscious of my bereaved condition-(con't on page 2)

A Mother's Hope

When our son died, I hoped it was a mistake. It was not.

I hoped it was a dream. It was not. Before my son died, I hoped for enough time in that day to clean my house, provide my family with clean laundry, taxi service and healthy meals. I loved dinner time with my family. After my son died, I did not know what day it was, cleaning our home or doing laundry were things I no longer thought of. I did not cook, I did not shop for food, I did not eat. I hoped he would come back.

He did not. I hoped I would gain understanding. I did not. I could not understand how I could wake up on a perfectly normal morning and my son was gone from his room, gone from our home and gone from our lives. I hoped for acceptance. I found none. I hoped those around me would understand me. They did not. How could my beautiful, vibrant, healthy son be gone?

I hoped for peace. I had none. I hoped for sleep. I had none. I hoped for courage to resume my daily life. My life was out of my control. The only thing I was sure of in the early days of my grief was that I knew our life would never be the same again. I hoped this empty feeling would go away. It did not. I hoped that some day my family would be normal again. We were not. I hoped I could stop looking for our son in every young man I saw that was tall, slim and had sandy colored curly hair. I could not. I hoped I could become the parent to my surviving children that I knew they deserved. I could not I knew how much they were hurting but I could not help myself and I could not help my children. My younger son needed my comfort. My daughter, expecting her own child needed my comfort. I was their mother but there was no comfort in me to give. I hoped I could be a wife to my husband. I could

that I desperately miss my son every single day. That almost everything I experience reminds me of how sad I always am, despite appearances. That even life's little delights – a sunny day, the garden coming back to life after a dismal winter, a friend's family holiday shared along with their laughing grandchildren – everything seems to magnify the pain that is always just behind the opaque window of my soul. I can see it clearly from the inside. I'm glad no one else can.

So who cares what anybody thinks. I've learned I must find my own comfort, my own salve. I'm most comfortable with friends who know exactly how I feel – because they have had the same experience. We can laugh even while we commiserate about our shared sensibilities. We have no need to explain ourselves to each other. We just *know*.

We give ourselves permission. Permission to laugh and to learn how to go on, even while we grieve. We make choices – the choice to continue – to live our lives the best we know how while treasuring the memories of what we once had and what we once were. I knew this trip wasn't going to be easy. I didn't know it was going to be as difficult as it actually is. But having made it this far I can dare to stop and assess my progress. I'm not unhappy with who I've become. It's a life I never expected but it's the hand I was dealt. And as they say, it's not so much the cards you're dealt, but how you play the hand.

I never hoped for laughter. How could I laugh when my son was dead. I hoped the feelings that consumed my every waking moment would somehow change so I did not feel as though I could never again be in a public place without crying. At 6 months after my son died, I hoped for a reprieve. I no longer could stand the pain and I saw my doctor. I knew he must have an answer to my question, "How long will I feel like this?" He did not. I had begun attending Bereaved Parents meetings and hardly spoke a word at the first meeting. I could not stop talking at my second meeting. I had found the glimmer of hope that I had been searching for. I hoped this all consuming grief would never again happen to my family. But it did! When my daughter in law was 6 months pregnant, my son told me their baby had died. How I grieved for my son. I knew what he was feeling. I hoped to be able to help him and his wife. I could not.

I then realized that all of the things I had hoped for had begun to come about but had taken a lot of time. I hoped my son and his wife could hold on long enough for time to help and heal. They have. When my son died, I never hoped for joy. I could not imagine joy as part of our lives ever again. But there is joy. When my son was a baby, a toddler, a young child, a teenager and young man, I watched over him. I thought I would watch over him for my entire life. But I was wrong. I hope with all my heart that he is watching over me.

I now have the understanding I hoped for. I have peace. I finally sleep. I find joy every time I see a tall, slim young man with sandy colored curly hair. I do not cry as often. So there is hope. We all have a future; we have memories. No matter how long our children were part of our lives, we have memories. The first time I realized that joy would one day be part of my life was the day I remembered a trick my son played on his little brother. He gave him a glass of buttermilk instead of regular milk and pretended it was a mistake. We have laughed so many times about this little story. I can still see the twinkle in his eye. I can hear my son and daughter as he made up names for her to tease her. Oh, how he loved to laugh. I remember the look on his face when I discovered the snake he put in my garden terrarium. I know the joy I feel every time I think of my son, share a memory with someone or look at pictures of him will never change.

My hope as a Mother is that we all will find peace and cherish the joy our children have brought to our lives.

Siblings

If I could speak to all the siblings out there, I'd say

I know you're frightened – and maybe feeling anger and guilt, for those are normal feelings at times like these.

I know it isn't fair, but some of life isn't. It's hard to accept that fact, isn't it? I know you may even resent having some special time in your life interfered with by your parents' prolonged grieving. Be patient. There will be better days.

I know you may be sorry you said or did some things that involved your dead sister or brother. Sibling rivalry is a normal and natural thing. All of us say and do things we wish we hadn't. That's a part of being human. Forgive yourself for being human and try to remember the good times, too.

If you're older, I know you find it difficult to share the pain you're feeling with your parents because you can see they are having a hard time. Your impulse is to protect them – and that includes from your own pain. Sometimes you become the parent and they, the child. Do you realize that if you do too great a job of disguising your grief, your parents may misunderstand and think you aren't grieving at all? Share some parts, at least, with them if you can. It is better for you and them to release your feelings rather than bottle them up and pretend everything is okay.

I know you become discouraged after a while when you find you aren't able to make your parents "better".

It isn't a failure on your part that this is true. Try to accept the fact that it takes much time and grief work before they can be better. They, and you, have lost something very important and it isn't possible for them to put it all behind them and go on as though nothing has changed. All of the crying and unhappiness you are seeing is necessary for them to go through before they can reach the other side of the grief process where it is less painful.

I know you begin to wonder if your dead sibling was your parents' favorite child and if you really matter at all. Oh! You do! Had it been you, or any of your brothers or sisters, it would be the same, for this is the way it is when any child dies. It may take some time before your parents can show it in obvious ways, but you are one of the most important reasons they struggle so to regain some equilibrium in their lives. You are important!

I know you wonder sometimes if your parents are remembering the same person since they only seem to remember him or her as being a perfect angel with no faults. You, on the other hand, may remember some qualities that weren't so saintly. When you are remembering your sibling, bring up some of the irritating things he or she used to do so that everyone can remember him or her as he or she really was – a human being, complete with good and bad. It's hard to live with the memory of a saint, isn't it?

I know it may be bothersome if you find your parents are overly concerned for your safety now. They may tend to overprotect, but you need to understand that they now know that bad things do indeed happen to good people and their security is shattered. Just a simple thoughtful act like calling if you're going to be later than expected can really help them and make them less anxious.

Holidays and birthdays will be more painful than fun in the beginning. Try to understand if old traditions are put aside right now and don't demand that everything be exactly as it used to be. Given time, you and your family will work out just how you want and need to observe special family occasions and there will be enjoyable times in your home again. They just may have to be observed in different ways than before.
