In the Presence of An Absence by Marie Levine

Sometimes I lie awake nights thinking about ways to describe what it feels like. But how can we describe a black hole? That's a concept I never understood. And I suppose, that's as close to an apt description as I will ever get. I don't know why it's important to be able to metaphorically describe it. But somehow, once the absence of your child enters your life, it becomes so big, so palpable, so incomprehensible, so always there, that we spend the rest of our lives trying to understand it by adequately describing it.

Being absent is not being there. But our child's absence creates a presence that is more constant than if they were actually physically there. Perhaps it is the unnatural permanence of their absence that creates a presence that we cannot put aside. That "neverness" so poignantly described by Nicholas Woltorstorff in his "Lament For A Son". Some relate it to the story of "the elephant in the room". It is an invisible presence that only we can feel. Those who care about us may believe, as time goes on, that we are functioning without that presence. But we know that the absence caused by the death of our children creates a void that is almost physical – an invisible black hole in which we carry all the love, the heartache, the grief, the disbelief, the anger, the longing for our lost child – and only we can see it and feel it.

As we negotiate ourselves through the coming of the Holiday season, the presence of the absence we live with on a daily basis, becomes an even heavier burden. Reluctant to worry those who love us with the overwhelming sadness brought on by the onslaught of joyousness, we put on a brave face and do our best to participate in the season. But their absence is always present. And that absence (cont'd page 3)

AUTUMN FEELINGS by Evelyn Billings - Springfield, MA

During the next couple of months, we will see many changes taking place in the world around us. The amount of daylight is decreasing; nights are becoming chilly; we'll often need some sweaters or jackets as we venture forth each day. However, the most dramatic change we notice here in New England during September and October is that of the trees trading their green summer outfits for the brilliant reds, oranges and golds of autumn.

Many of us who are bereaved parents find ourselves feeling tense and depressed when the earth awakens in the spring; we may also experience these feelings when the dramatic changes of autumn occur.

A wise lady once said to me, "our bodies respond to the changing seasons." She was right. They do! And they respond by FEELING. It seems to me that all of the grief feelings that I have - emptiness, sadness, anger, loneliness, guilt and depression - are all intensified as the world of nature around me changes.

Sometimes, however, we can draw strength from situations that see, on the surface, to be negative. A few weeks after Linda's death, I heard from two friends within a few days of each other. One said. "you know, when I am troubled, I get out and walk until I find something in nature that I've never seen before. I look at it and think about it, and I am renewed." The other friend, who had some physical disabilities, wrote me a note in which she said, "whenever I feel discouraged, I find something in nature to study, and I am renewed."

seems even bigger than the actual presence of our children, had they lived.

It's a quandary, this need to adequately describe what we're feeling. Volumes have been written in our attempts to make the uninitiated "get it" and introduce the newly bereaved to what lies ahead – to assure them that they are not losing their minds, only discovering for themselves what none of us have been able to describe. I've said it before – there's a chemical change that enables us to feel the pain of this particular despair. No other sadness compares. And that is why we can only describe these sensibilities in metaphor. Though most can relate to the loss of a parent, a pet, or a friend, only those who live it can relate to the loss of a child.

And I guess that is why we all keep trying to describe the indescribable. We think once we describe it sufficiently, civilians will feel the intensity of our despair and we'll be understood by everyone and forgiven for feeling as we do and for changing onto the people we become. It's a puzzlement.

So here we go again. Plunging in to the season of joy. Remember this season, it's all about you. Be kind to yourself. Be gentle to yourself. Our children are still with us. Wrapping us all in a big, warm, cuddly hug. Feel it.

The time of concern is over. No longer am I asked how I am doing. A curtain descends. The moment has passed. A life slips from frequent recall. There are exceptions; close and compassionate friends, sensitive and loving family. For me, the drama is over. The spotlight is off. Applause is silent. But for me, the play will never end. The effects on me are timeless. Say Olin to me. On the stage of my life, he has been both lead and supporting actor. Do not tiptoe around one of the greatest moments of my life. Love does not die. His name is written on my life. The sound of his voice replays within my mind. You feel he is dead. I feel he is of the dead and still lives. Forever a part of me, beckoning in future welcome. You say he was my brother, I say he is. Say Olin to me and say Olin again.

It hurts to bury his memory in silence. What he was in flesh is now ashes. What he is in spirit is alive in Heaven. He is of my past, but he is part of me now. He is my hope for the future. You say not to remind me. How little you understand. I cannot forget. I would not if I could. I understand you, but feel pain in being forced to do so. I forgive you because you cannot know. And I would forgive you anyway. I accept how you see me, but I understand you see me not at all.

I strive not to judge you, for yesterday I was like you. I love you, will make no exceptions toward you. But I wish you could understand that I dwell both in flesh and spirit. The mystery is that you do too, but know it not. I do not ask you to walk this road. The ascent is steep and the burden heavy. I walk it not by choice. What I have lost, you cannot feel. What I have gained you cannot see. Say Olin, for his memory is alive in me. He and I will meet again, though in many ways we have never parted. He and his life play light songs in my mind. Sunrises and sunsets on my dreams. He is real and shadow, was and is. Say Olin to me and say Olin again.

Initially, in these pairings, we will be the needier. Someone who has been there can be our guide, our hope-inducing model. Then, after a while, we will take our turn as the guide. But even then, the sorrow that lingers will lessen as we give life-giving hope to another. See, I made it through. So can you. I'm grateful to those who have reached out to me and for the opportunities I will have to reach out to others.

I think hearing from these two friends within just a few days of each other had to be more than just a coincidence. I feel that there was an important message there for me, and I've tried to act on it.

I can draw strength from an early morning walk, from frost patterns on our windows, from a raging blizzard, from birds at our feeder, from a rainbow, a ladybug or a whale - if I slow down, think about those things, observe their intricacy and beauty , and attempt to let some of their energy into myself.

We have to slow down, try to realize what is happening to us and be receptive to the energy that is in the natural world for us. When I'm down because it's a sparkling, clear, colorful autumn day and Linda isn't here to experience it with me, I have to feel that pain, then let it go so that the natural beauty and energy around me can strengthen and renew me.

Let yourself experience autumn - the emptiness and aching that you feel. Then try to let go of those feelings, just enough to Set the wonder and the beauty of the season into yourself - one day at a time.

Grief: When does it stop hurting by Anna Quindlen-

Pulitzer prize winning columnist

Grief reminds one of the few things that has the power to silence us. It is a whisper in the world and a clamor within. More than sex, more than faith, even more than its usher death, grief is unspoken, publicly ignored except for those moments at the funeral, that are over too quickly, or the conversations among those of us who recognize in one another a kindred chasm deep in the center of who we are.

Maybe we do not speak of it because death will mark us all sooner or later. Maybe it is unspoken because grief is only the first part of it. After a time it becomes less sharp, but larger, to a more enduring thing called loss. Perhaps that is why this is the least explored passage: because it has no end.

The world loves closure, loves a thing that can, as they say, be gotten through. This is why it comes as a great surprise to find that loss is forever, that two decades after the event there are those occasions when something in you cries out at the continual presence of an absence. The landscape of our lives becomes as full of craters as the surface of the moon. We are defined by who we have lost.
