Still here...

"...it is Peter who has made me what I am. I can't thank you enough for teaching me that Peter continues to be the biggest, most important part of my life. Thank you for letting me share him with you and thank you all for sharing your children with me. Everything I do today is because Peter lived. Thank you for giving me a place where I'll always be Peter's Mom."

With those words I accepted my Chapter Leadership Award at the TCF National Conference in California in 2012. I left the stage to many hoots and hollers and warm hugs all around. It was a really heartwarming moment for me. It's now been 29 years since I found TCF and it is amazing to me that I am still here, that I function as well as I do and that I continue to find joy in my life. All seemingly impossible outcomes so many years ago.

On this incredible journey, I've often written about where I've found myself along the way. In the early years I wrote about the pain, the longing, the need to matter, the hopelessness, the disappointment, the confusion, the despair – my personal experience. As the years went on, I discovered hope had returned in my writing, and many of my fellow travelers said they found validation there because they too were experiencing the same feelings I related in my columns.

I stopped feeling guilt about enjoying what I could of my life. I acknowledged that Peter would have wanted me to make the most of the time I have here. I discovered that his presence wasn't fading as I had feared in the beginning. He had instead, become the very reason I felt compelled to do so much of what I was doing.

Because Peter died, I discovered a pain that no one had (con't on page 2)

Why? - NOT!!!

We have just commemorated the fifth anniversary of the death of my son. A half a decade has passed since I have looked at David's face or heard his laugh. When I learned of his death, I did not think I could survive five minutes. Yet five years have come and gone, and I remain here. The sheer incomprehensibility, the absolute impossibility, the overwhelming irrationality of the fact that he is no longer part of my family is as puzzling now as it was all those seasons ago.

I think the tall, slim young man with the loosely tied, plaid scarf who is crossing my path is he. At night, while in that liminal space poised between sleep and wakefulness, he morphs before me, greeting me with his unique, crooked smile, telling me he is fine and that I worry too much. I read a book he would enjoy, and I am about to email it title to him. On his birthday, I am totally unhinged by a stubborn fantasy that I will be celebrating, not mourning. Can he really be dead? And can I still be imagining that he really is not, and am I having an especially long, harrowing nightmare that will eventually end?

I am older, sadder, but not wiser. Not that I don't try to discover some transcendent wisdom, find explanations, garner insight, cultivate a spiritual outlook. I just can't seem to wrap my head around the awfulness of my child's fate. This painful and (I know in my head but not my heart) pointless mulling is inevitably followed by my own rehashing of the past and how I might have been able to change the tragic course of events. The could have, would have, should and should not haves continue to haunt me.

The death of a child is not an unfortunate event, its impact fading over time. Perhaps the most unwelcome comment grieving parents hear is the surprised expressions by those who muse, *you're still not over it?* one, ten or twenty years after their loss. The truth is, that since my son died, he looms larger than life in my consciousness. I am always missing him, and the sense of

ever been able to describe. It literally took my breath away. It changed everything I knew. It changed the way I saw the world. It changed my whole life. Surviving the loss of my precious only child changed who I am. Everything I thought I knew became unimportant. Learning how to breathe again – the very act of breathing – was the beginning of my new life. The sense of despair and hopelessness was so bewildering and inexplicable I was sure my mind had simply imploded.

I have never forgotten that early sensibility. And because the memory is so vivid, I cannot help but reach out to those who have come after me – reaching out, being there for the newly bereaved, figuring out how to let the unknowing learn about TCF and how hope lives here - those activities have been the most healing for me.

Though most travelers eventually learn to reinvent themselves and move on into their newly designed lives complete with the memories of their lost children – many of us choose to stay connected to The Compassionate Friends. And although I hesitate to confess to those who join a meeting for the first time, that I have been here for 29 years for fear of scaring them into proclaiming that they won't still be grieving after 29 years – I know ultimately they will learn that I am no longer grieving the loss of Peter, but acknowledging the impact he has had on my life.

Because of my affiliation with TCF, the support I've given and the support I have received, Peter is ever present in my life. The time spent with TCF is Peter time. Though he is physically gone, I am still here, keeping him present in a world that should have been his. That final stage of grief is internal and forever. And after all these years I'm surer than ever that it is Peter who continues to have the greatest effect on me – and one day, when we meet again, we're going to have so much to talk about!

I can respond to these compulsive ruminations in the only way possible – ignore them. Why? they torment mercilessly. Not! I reply, ending the discussion before it begins.

Do Not Stand at My Grave and Weep

Do not stand at my grave and weep,
I am not there; I do not sleep.
I am a thousand winds that blow,
I am the diamond glints on snow,
I am the sun on ripened grain,
I am the gentle autumn rain.
When you awaken in the morning's hush
I am the swift uplifting rush
Of quiet birds in circling flight.
I am the soft star-shine at night.
Do not stand at my grave and cry,
I am not there; I did not die.

The poem, an elegy, is sometimes called "I Am" due to its repetition of the biblical phrase. Was the poem inspired? The Hebrew name for God, YHWH, means "I am" or "I am that I am." And there does seem to be something magical about the poem, as it was written by a woman who, to our knowledge, had never written a poem before. Mary Elizabeth Frye was an orphan with no formal education. In 1932 she and her husband hosted a young Jewish woman, Margaret Schwarzkopf, who was fleeing the Holocaust. When she received news that her mother had died in Germany, the heartbroken housequest told Frye in despair that she had never had the chance to "stand by my mother's grave and shed a tear." Frye found herself composing the poem above on a ripped-off section of a brown paper shopping bag. She said the words "just came to her."

DO YOU KNOW WHO I AM?

I am flesh and blood, torn mind, and broken heart. I feel at times like a wise old woman – but then, in the next moment like a small child.

I admit total confusion. I look in the mirror and see someone I'm not sure I know. I want an answer; I want a solution – to a problem that has neither on this earth.

It seems that nothing matters anymore and yet at the same time I have learned that everything does. That there are billions of people on this earth. When one of them dies, it matters.

I ache to a degree that only another who has crossed this bridge could gauge. And only they can for a moment understand my torment.

Do you know who I am?

I am a bereaved mother – the last thing I ever thought I would be. My child has died before me, the most unnatural thing in the word. And my continued being seems the next most unnatural thing in the world.

A portion of my heart, spirit, and dreams – and all thoughts of total peace, are with Ryan, never to be recovered to make a whole until I see him again.

The tears I cry are not for me, but for the beautiful life that ended far too soon. And the utterly helpless frustration of not being able to do anything to change that.

Re-entering school after the death of a sibling

Going back to school after the death of your brother or sister is a hard thing to go through. At first there are three groups of people to deal with; people who give you a lot of support, people who don't know what to say, and those who give you weird looks and stay away from you. This lasts for a little while. After a short time, changes with each group occur.

Those who didn't know what to say start to speak or begin to talk. The group who kept away stop ignoring you. The people who gave you a lot of support, slowly return to their own affairs. After about a month and a half, everything goes back to normal and is over to everyone but you. This is very difficult to accept and makes you feel all the more alone.

After a while the shock for you goes away and it is then that you need the support from your friends, peers, and teachers.

Dear Ann Landers:

As a bereaved sibling, I was disappointed in your response to "Anonymous in Raleigh, NC", who asked whether it would be appropriate to send her parents a card on the anniversary of her brother's death. You advised her not to send a card, but to take her parents to dinner, "with no mention of the sad anniversary."

Bereaved parents will tell you that the one thing they want to do is talk about their child. Ignoring the anniversary of a child's death is the same as ignoring the child's birthday: it makes bereaved parents feel as though their child didn't exist. Many bereaved parents have told me that their surviving children will not talk about their brother or sister who has died. Often this is because they are afraid of upsetting their parents. However, bereaved parents yearn to hear their children mention the dead child's name. "Anonymous" should be encouraged in her efforts to remember the anniversary of her brothers death by sending a card to her parents.

On the anniversary of my brother's death, I send a special card to my parents to tell them I am thinking about them and remembering my brother. We open our hearts to each other and share our memories of him and how much we miss him. We also put flowers on his grave that day and have flowers on the church alter in his memory on the Sunday closest to the anniversary of his death. In other words, the day is not like any other day. My life and my parents' lives changed forever the day he died. Making no mention of it would only be another tragedy.
