GRIEF: When Does It Stop Hurting

Grief reminds one of the few things that has the power to silence us. It is a whisper in the world and a clamor within. More than sex, more than faith, even more than its usher death, grief is unspoken, publicly ignored except for those moments at the funeral, that are over too quickly, or the conversations among those of us who recognize in one another a kindred chasm deep in the center of who we are.

Maybe we do not speak of it because death will mark all of us sooner or later. Maybe it is unspoken because grief is only the first part of it. After a time, it becomes something less sharp, but larger, to a more enduring thing called loss. Perhaps that is why this is the least explored passage: because it has no end.

The world loves closure, loves a thing that can, as they say, be gotten through. This is why it comes as a great surprise to find that loss is forever, that two decades after the event there are those occasions when something in you cries out at the continued presence of an absence. The landscape of all our lives becomes as full of craters as the surface of the moon. We are all defined by who we have lost.

Wonder years

I've often heard the term "wonder years" when referring to childhood. When everything, every sight, every sound brought us a sense of amazement. Some of the dictionary definitions describe wonder as "to be filled with admiration or awe", "something that causes surprise, astonishment or admiration", "a miracle, miraculous deed or event". But there are other definitions, and they are what occupy my mind nowadays.

In the beginning of this challenging life my sense of wonder was total dismay. How could this be? What could have caused this to happen? Why did this happen? If only it didn't happen. I was filled with wonder then...the how's the what's the why's... wondering...wondering...

Thirty years later, I find myself once again filled with wonder. I wonder what my life would be like if Peter were here. I wonder if he would be married. I wonder if I would be a grandma doing all those grandmotherly things I had always imagined and that now only my friends enjoy.... I wonder where he would be living. I wonder what he would be doing. I wonder what he would look like – he left a 22 year old graduate...he'd be a 52 year old man today. I wonder if he'd have a mustache...like his dad...

So much to wonder about. Life does that. It promises so much. Not surprising that it almost always disappoints. Though we learn early on that life includes loss, nothing we have learned remotely prepares us for what we must endure. For us, the disappointment astonishes. For us, the loss is so unspeakable, so incomparable, it defies any rational explanation...and so, we wonder.

We wonder first, how we will survive. Then we wonder why we survive. We wonder how we can endure the pain. We are amazed when we meet people who have survived similar

We care about your grief—the tragedy that each of us have shared—and how we can grow through it, not back to the person we were, but to the person we can become.

A Thousand Ways to Grieve

I'm an active griever. By active, I mean that during those first few months following my loss, I devoured every book on grief I could get my hands on. I poured out my agony in my writing, attended grief seminars, went through photo albums and I searched the internet for helpful sites. I cried and fumed and spent long hours talking to anyone who would

My husband simply withdrew and grieved in silence. Though we lived in the same house, grieved the same loss, and shared a life together, we were apart in our grief. We all have our own ideas on how to grieve and we're quick to judge those who don't conform to our way of thinking. When Prince Charles wore a blue suit to Princess Diana's funeral, he was condemned by the press until it was learned it was his former wife's favorite.

A friend of mine was criticized for wearing a pair of red strap, high heeled shoes to her husband's funeral, the same shoes she wore on the day they met.

If we are to grieve in harmony with those around us, we must give up the notion that grief can be expressed in limited ways. I once thought that grief manifested itself only in tears and depression. But I've seen what others whose vision is greater than mine have accomplished in the name of grief. Candy Lightner, the founder of Mothers Against Drunk Drivers, is a good example.

Resolve to make peace with someone who grieves in ways that seem odd to you. Try expressing your grief in a new way: write a poem or song, start a journal, buy your loved one a gift and send it to someone you know who would love and appreciate the gesture. Wear something outlandish. Buy a bouquet of balloons in your loved ones favorite color. Laugh at something that would make your loved one laugh.

Tears, depression and sadness are all acceptable ways to show grief. So are blue suits and red shoes.

experiences for even a few years and appear "normal". We wonder if we will ever reach that point. Silently we wonder if they loved their kids as much as we loved ours. ..we wonder if they are "over it". We know we will never be.

As time goes on and we learn all the coping skills we need to endure, we wonder at the process. How on earth did we survive?. How did we become the new people we are now?

I'm always wondering. I wonder if there really is another side. I wonder how it is possible that all the energy that was Peter could simply evaporate. I wonder about all the strange things that happen around me that seem to be messages from my disappeared child. I wonder why we were singled out by the fates to live this

I wonder about the choices we do have. In the beginning I didn't even seem to have the ability to choose to breathe. I wonder, thinking back to those earliest days, how on earth I chose to do the things I did. I'm glad now, that I made what have turned out to be good choices. I've spent the last thirty years totally invested in Peter's life. Almost everything I do, from my involvement with The Compassionate Friends, to writing about my experience, to nurturing my garden....keeps Peter ever present in my life.

Most of all, I continue to wonder what it will be like when we are together again. It's a thought that always brings a smile. I don't wonder what we'll talk about.....we'll talk about what might have been.

Siblings

Thanks for immediately telling me about what happened and the details of how, as soon as you knew.

I needed to cry with you, and to cry alone. We all need to cry together, especially in the beginning of our grief. I needed your hugs to help me.

When you see people who resemble him, tell me so I don't think I'm a little crazy. The first year this happened often. Let me share my night-mares with you until they go away.

You helped me by asking me to help you. You helped me when you told me you were having trouble with the realization of his death. Talking about memories and what it was like when...is OK, but I'm here now and I need you to think about me. It's selfish but necessary for me to feel needed, wanted and loved and near you.

Understand that when I turn to my friends it's because I need to identify with them. I do talk to them about his death, more times than I talk to you. They're closer to my age and they help me to go on with my life.

When we talk, remember that he was my brother and we had our sibling rivalries and fights. He wasn't perfect, but neither am I. You helped me not to feel guilty about the fights we did have and told me he's forgiven me and I should forgive him, especially if I get mad because he died and left us.

After my sister died, I hated God. I threw things around my room and cried an awful lot. My mother told me later it was my way of dealing with it and that it was okay and I was okay too! Listed below are some helpful hints for parents:

- Let your children talk express their feelings.
- Surround them with people but familiar and comforting people..
- Don't put the deceased child up on a pedestal while putting down your other children. Talk of your child but talk of good and bad memories – be realistic and don't think you have to make your child out to be a saint – stay in perspective.
- Hug your kids. They're going to be feeling guilty about ugly words or arguments they've had with their deceased sibling.
- Never tell your kids to be strong for somebody else. I don't know anyone who can be strong when their world is crashing down on them. Let your kids cry, scream, throw tantrums – this is the time for it.
- Be there for your kids. They'll need you at moments that you sometimes wouldn't expect. It might hurt you to talk about it but don't cut them off because that could lead to them holding it in.

Talking helped me to realize my feelings more. It helped me to get my feelings out in the open. At first it was hard to talk but as I got older it helped to talk. It brought us closer as a family We realize each other's feelings and try to understand each other better now. I realize the importance of being nice. We don't know what might happen in the next hour or day.
