Thoughts from Marie...

In 2008 I marked fifteen years of bereavement. Peter died in 1993 and I had been saved by my affiliation with The Compassionate Friends – attending meetings, facilitating and, becoming chapter leader, and especially newsletter editor – writing about my journey and discovering that my experience was shared by so many. After more than three decades of meetings it became apparent to me that sharing that (three decades!) info at the point of introduction to the newly bereaved in attendance was somewhat terrifying for them...was it going to take that long for them to begin healing, they thought?...was this an endless journey? In truth, I no longer needed the meetings – but the meetings seemed to need me. So I stayed. Finally, last year I moved from the city and meetings became too difficult to attend. But in truth, I still need the connection. A few years ago, I began a monthly newsletter instead of the quarterly one our chapter had for years. Putting it together each month keeps me in touch with my grief - a grief that has morphed into something different, unlike my early grief. The pain has subsided and along with the coming on of old age, a soft longing accompanies my constant ruminating on my long life, what might have been, and what a miracle my redesigned life actually is. As I assemble each newsletter, I go through pages and pages of materials I've collected through the years. Poems and articles and essays – some written by me, some by the many amazing compassionate friends I've made through the years – reminding me of the torment and devastation of early grief – and the softening and healing that time brings to the experience.

I used to think that everything that could be said about losing a child has been said. But truth is, every parent new to (con't on page 2)

this world experiences grief anew- unlike any other grief but still the same. Like every tourist seeing the Eiffel Tower or the Leaning Tower – photographed millions of times – seeing it with their own eyes for the first time is once again a unique experience. So too is our personal loss and our own unique grief journey. This doesn't happen to everyone. Ours is a life experience so indescribable that we seek out others who are struggling with the same confusion. It helps to know we're not alone, and many of us find relief in writing about it.. As I wrote at the publication of my book, "Such deep unfathomable grief, makes poets of us all. Only the quietly written word, wrenched from the depths of the soul, comes close to describing the pain. We the grieving translate the keening cries and desperate screams of disbelief into the poetry that consoles us."

Thirty-two years ago there were very few books about child loss. Today there are hundreds Reading about the experience of others and discovering how almost universal are the thoughts and feelings of the newly bereaved, helps to validate much of the confusion. I'm proud that two of those books are mine. First You Die, published in 2004 and The Tincture of Time published in 2008 reflect my journey along with the journey of so many others. I'm glad I was able to support so many others in their most desolate time. I thank all of my compassionate friends for all the years they supported me.

If they asked me, I could write a book.....

When I wrote this, I was approaching the 15 year mark. Fifteen amazing, unbelievable years since I've seen or spoken to my son. Fifteen years since I've heard his voice, touched his face, hugged him, reprimanded him, laughed with him, shared a moment with him. Fifteen years and I am still here...alive, breathing, living a life.

I wrote this the day after we shared our annual Manhattan chapter Spring dinner. As you read this, our Holiday Dinner is fast approaching. I always enjoy these get-togethers when so many of my compassionate friends, who have stopped coming to meetings, show up to reunite and share a couple of pleasant hours with friends who experienced their most desolate hours together years ago. I've made a lot of friends through the years ... and we are all like veterans who know what it is like to have been through a war together. We are survivors. look to us with hope ... that they too may one day feel like we do. So, how do we feel?

So many of my friends ask me when I am going to write another book. I always find it gratifying to know that my writing has been as helpful as it has been to my fellow travelers. And that so many of those who continue to join us find my book and are still comforted by my words. I myself often turn to my own writing and am always amazed that I wrote it. The book is such a reflection of the

passionate despair I was experiencing each time I sat down to write. When I think now, of writing again, I must consider how much this journey has altered who I was then and who I have become. If I were to write again, I would be writing from a totally different perspective... from a distance that I could never have imagined 15 years ago.

Those of us who have been traveling for a while are far from the intensity of the pain. And as the pain diminishes, the longing grows. We must be careful in how we relate what we feel to the newly bereaved. I think back to my earliest grief. I couldn't be told it would get 'better'. I didn't want to hear that the pain 'eases'. I wanted to cling to the pain. It was all I had.

But today, I must admit, the tincture of time has worked on my soul. It is hard to describe what the grief turns into. Only those who live this life know what I am feeling. There really are no words. That's why survivors stick to one another. We are beyond trying to describe or explain what this feels like. It's somehow comforting to know that even though I look "fine", have started a new job, make future plans, and enjoy the company of the uninitiated... my veteran compassionate friends know what burdens I carry in my heart. Even if those civilians take comfort in believing I am indeed, 'over it', 'It" is always there. It's just below the surface, always ready to bubble up and take over the moment. Now, fifteen years later, I am even more careful to protect myself from exposure. My grief has become the most private part of who I am.

So if I were to take up pen (keyboard?) again, of what would I write? Without the passion and intensity of pain, what would I write? Having morphed into a quietly forward moving, severely damaged, surviving, terminally bereaved parent, who appears normal to the unknowing...

What would I write?

I consider myself one of the fortunate ones. Reaching out to others and knowing they felt helped during their most intensely despairing days because of some things I may have said, really helped me to grow through this experience. I am grateful that I could do this and even more grateful for all the wonderful friends I have made on my journey. Some days I think all that can be said, has been said. Now, 15 years later, I am considered to be somewhat of an authority on surviving the death of one's only child. I could write a book about the millions of things I would rather be an authority on. Maybe I'll do that.

For Grieving Mothers

I am a mother. I am a bereaved mother. My child died, and this is my reluctant path. It is not a path of my choice, but it is a path I must walk mindfully and with intention. It is a journey through the darkest night of my soul and it will take time to wind through the places that scare me.

Every cell in my body aches and longs to be with my beloved child. On days when grief is loud, I may be impatient, distracted, frustrated, and unfocused. I may get angry more easily, or I may seem hopeless. I will shed many, many, many tears. I won't smile as often as my old self. Smiling hurts now. Most everything hurts some days, even breathing.

But please, just sit beside me.

Say nothing.

Do not offer a cure.

Or a pill, or a word, or a potion.

Witness my suffering and don't turn away from me.

Please be gentle with me.

And I will try to be gentle with me too.

I will not ever "get over" my child's death so please don't urge me down that path.

Even on days when grief is quiescent, when it isn't standing loudly in the foreground, even on days when I am even able to smile again, the pain is just beneath the surface.

There are days when I still feel paralyzed. My chest feels the sinking weight of my child's absence and, sometimes, I feel as if I will explode from the grief.

Losing my child affects me in so many ways: as a woman, a mother, a human being. It affects every aspect of me: spiritually, physically, mentally, and emotionally. There are days when I barely recognize myself in the mirror anymore.

Grief is as personal to me as my fingerprint. Don't tell me how I should or shouldn't be grieving or that I should or shouldn't "feel better by now." Don't tell me what's right or wrong. I'm doing it my way, in my time. If I am to survive this, I must do what is best for me.

My understanding of life will change and a different meaning of life will slowly evolve. What I knew to be true or absolute or real or fair about the world has been challenged so I'm finding my way, moment-to-moment in this new place. Things that once seemed important to me are barely thoughts any longer. I notice life's suffering more-hungry children, the homeless and the destitute, a mother's harsh voice toward her young child- or an elderly person struggling with the door. There are so many things about the world which I now struggle to understand: Why do children die? There are some questions, I've learned, which are simply unanswerable.

So please don't tell me that "God has a plan" for me. This, my friend, is between me and my God. Those platitudes slip far too easily from the mouths of those who tuck their own child into a safe, warm bed at night: Can you begin to imagine your own child, flesh of your flesh, lying lifeless in a casket, when "goodbye" means you'll never see them on this Earth again? one day with everything 'okay' and life back to normal. I have a new normal now.

As time passes, I may gain gifts, and treasures, and insights but anything gained was too high a cost when compared to what was lost. Perhaps, one day, when I am very, very old, I will say that time has truly helped to heal my broken heart. But always remember that not a second of any minute of any hour of any day passes when I am not aware of the presence of my child's absence, no matter how many years lurk over my shoulder, don't forget that I have another one, another child, whose absence, like the sky, is spread over everything as C.S. Lewis said.

My child may have died; but my love - and my motherhood - never will.

NATURE'S RAINBOWS

We held them in our parent arms for days or weeks or months. Now we hold them in our hearts and cry the darkest tears.

The cord attached to children, eternally fine and strong.
We never leave the missing; it holds us all life long.

Our children now inside us Our souls' tattooed with gold. Their love, their words, caresses, are hugs that we still hold.

If we open to the knowledge, that they aren't completely gone, we will sometimes feel their touching, sometimes soft and sometimes strong.

When they show us nature's rainbows, We can feel their proud delight, sending signs to show they're living, only far beyond our sight.
